

We have been hearing the word community a lot in recent times: An Untold Story, the community retelling the story of Govan & Linthouse: using our facilities for the benefit of the community and even asking 'what does the community want?' in our Thriving Places survey. However, what do we mean when we use the word community?

Generally, a community can be a social group of any size whose members reside in a specific locality, share government, and often have a common cultural and historical heritage. It can also be a social, religious, occupational group sharing common characteristics or interests that are distinct from larger society.

I like to think of community as people we have something 'in common' with. Whether that be where we live, our love for the same music, or interest in the same hobby. Whatever it is that we share, that is what makes us a community.

At Govan & Linthouse Parish we have lots of things 'in common' with those we see outside the Church. We may live in Govan, we meet in Govan and we will share very similar memories of Govan from over the years. It is important to realise that we are not seperate from the community that we so often speak of and that we have more in common than you may think.

AN UNTOLD STORY

In partnership with The Scottish Mental Health Arts Festival, Govan & Linthouse Parish will provide free community arts workshops encouraging participation of cultural activities as a means to promote health, well-being and conversation around mental health. The workshops will run through the month of May 2018, with the exhibition planned alongside the community ,for a later date. This initial project will act as a pilot for potential larger projects conducted by Govan & Linthouse Parish.

We are seeking to commission an artist with a background in community arts who can engage the community of Govan & Linthouse Parish and facilitate arts workshops with different groups. The artist will be able to work with local groups to develop artwork and draw on their own practice to create a series of publications, which are both visually engaging and informative, whilst highlighting positive coping strategies for mental health. The chosen artist will be able to present the work as a digital collage which incorporates photography and original artwork with text based information. The chosen artist will also publicly complete a historical series of painted glass reflecting the story of Govan & Linthouse, engaging the public to help them complete the series with context, influences, ideas and new work.

THE ARTIST

Veronica Jane Lynch: A Glasgow girl, I always wanted to be an artist and never wanted to do anything else. Against my parents wishes. I pursued my ambition and studied at Glasgow School of Art, gaining an Honours Degree in Silversmithing and Jewellery, Subsequently I was offered a position of Stained Class Artist and Designer with one of Scotland's largest stained and decorative glass firms. Over the years, I learned a broad range of stained and decorative glass techniques, creating designs for homes. churches and businesses across the UK. More than a few years later. I embarked on a new career as a teacher of Art and Design which I loved, yet the the draw of being a working artist beckoned. When the opportunity arose to finally pursue my ambition of working as a full time artist and designer. I was delighted to secure a fabulous gallery space in Dunblane. I am excited at the prospect on working on An Untold Story and am looking forward to uncovering the experiences of people with Govan & Linthouse Parish, I am also delighted to have the opportunity to design a bespoke piece for the Govan Cross Building.
